Lorne GP honoured

The 2009 Victorian Rural Doctors' Awards acknowledged Lorne GP Dr John Beaumont for his commitment to the region, at a ceremony in Melbourne on the weekend.

Doctor Beaumont received an award for his Outstanding Contribution to Rural Communities.

Victorian rural doctors were nominated by their peers, patients and local community members in three categories, *35 Years Service to Rural Communities*, for *Outstanding Contribution to Rural Communities* or as a *New Rural Doctor*.

Health Minister, Hon. Daniel Andrews presented the doctors and their families with the awards in front of 225 guests at a gala dinner.

Rural Workforce Agency Victoria (RWAV) chief executive Claire Austin explains the Awards' significance.

"The Awards provide an opportunity to pause and reflect on the contributions that our doctors and their families make to Victoria.

"Additionally, the Awards offer Victorians a way of saying 'thanks' to a corner stone of the population that sustain local communities in so many ways," Ms Austin said.

The 2009 Award recipients were from all corners of the state including, Sale, St Leonards, Moe, Elmore, Ouyen, Trafalgar, Mount Beauty, Beechworth, Wangaratta, Portland, Lakes Entrance, Sale, Benalla, Phillip Island, Traralgon and Camperdown.

RWAV chairman Dr Philip Webster also paid tribute to this year's recipients.

"As is the nature of general practice and medicine these contributions have been diverse and broad ranging.

"Amongst all the recipients honoured, the common thread was doctors sustaining their local community," Dr Webster said.

An awards panel comprising RWAV, Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, Australian College of Rural & Remote Medicine, Rural Doctors Association of Victoria Australian Medical Association Vic and Rural Medical Family Network representatives assessed nominees against the criteria for each of the categories.

The Awards were proudly sponsored by Victorian Managed Insurance Authority (VMIA), a statutory body established to provide risk management consultancy, insurance and site risk surveys to Victorian State Government departments and agencies.

Background information

Dr John Beaumont, Lorne – recognised for his Outstanding Contribution to Rural Communities

I was born and bred in the city but when I was a medical student I bought a motorcycle – my friends and I loved riding off into the country for weekends. That started my love for the bush.

After I graduated, I travelled and worked overseas. I came home and did several years as a hospital medico, working at many different specialties. I did many locums and then joined an inner suburban practice in Melbourne where I worked mostly in Fitzroy.

It got to the point where I pondered my future. I decided I loved the diversity of all medical disciplines. Combining that with a desire to live in the bush, rural practice seemed the right path for me.

So 25 years ago I bought a solo medical practice in the beautiful coastal town of Lorne. I also became the VMO to an eight bed public hospital so I could do obstetrics, anaesthetics, minor surgery, accident and emergency medicine as well as take my own x-rays. Of course doing all this in a rural setting involved being on call all the time. Especially difficult in a holiday town like Lorne! But no matter how tired I was, my attitude was that this was part of the deal.

My message to any young doctor contemplating a rural career is that rural medicine offers great rewards in terms of the excellent variety of work, the many interesting characters you meet, the wonderful network of a small community, and a gratifying country lifestyle with no traffic lights.
